ADMINISTRATIVE ORDER - AMENDED
NO. GAO 2020-7

WHEREAS:

1) Chief Justice Debra Stephens of the Washington State Supreme Court has adopted Second Revised and Extended Order Regarding Court Operations, No. 25700-B-625 granting emergency authority to this court to adopt, modify, and/or suspend court rules and orders, and to take further actions concerning court operations, as warranted to address the current state of emergency declared February 29, 2020 by Washington State Governor Jay Inslee and nationally by President Trump March 13, 2020, due to the public health emergency due to the outbreak of Coronavirus/COVID-19;

2) During this state of emergency, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Washington State Department of Health have recommended increasingly

1 stringent social distancing measures of six feet between people, and have encouraged
2 vulnerable individuals to avoid public spaces;

3 3) Consistent with these recommendations Governor Inslee issued a "Stay Home,
4 Stay Healthy" order directing non-essential businesses to close, banned public
5 gatherings and required Washington citizens to stay home except for essential
6 activities; and
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8 4) Clark County District Court serves both Clark County and the City of Vancouver
9 and is a shared courthouse with Clark County Superior Court. District Court frequently
10 serves close to 200 litigants per day who appear with family, friends, and attorneys on
11 one floor of the courthouse to attend motion hearings, protection order hearings,
12 arraignments, trials, infraction hearings, small claims trials, civil hearings, and probation
13 hearings. This list is only some, not all, of the matters heard each day and does not
14 include numbers for the people also appearing at the courthouse on Superior Court
15 matters. Given the number of identified and projected COVID-19 cases in Washington
16 State and the risk to public, court staff, witnesses, jurors and any other parties
17 scheduled to appear in court; and
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19 5) That court operations are recognized as essential and may often be conducted
20 by alternative means with measures taken for public safety. The response from the
21 court to prevent the further spread of COVID-19 must be continued while allowing the
22 court to operate effectively;
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25 Therefore, IT IS HEREBY ORDERED, that effective Monday, June 1, 2020:

26 1) All infraction hearings currently scheduled that require a court appearance of any
27 party will be rescheduled to a later date until all social distancing limitations are
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1 no longer recommended by order of Governor Inslee, recommendations of
2 Centers for Disease Control and/or Washington State Department of Health. The
3 court may in its discretion reschedule hearings virtually where available to the
4 court and parties. Mail-in mitigation and contested hearings will still be heard as
5 received;
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7 2) All civil ex parte motions will continue to be processed electronically; civil motions
8 may be noted and heard without oral argument virtually where possible (see
9 policy below);
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11 3) All newly filed Small Claims, Impounds, and Name Change Petitions have been
12 scheduled out past May 31, 2020 and will be heard virtually where possible;

13 4) Pursuant to Supreme Court of Washington Order No. 25700-B-625, all Anti-
14 Harassment and Stalking Protection Order hearings will be handled virtually
15 where possible until further notice. The court may continue cases where in-
16 person attendance is necessary based on recommended public health
17 measures. Requirements for personal service of the petition or temporary order
18 are suspended, except as to orders directing the surrender of firearms. Where
19 personal service is not required, service may be made by law enforcement,
20 including electronic service with acknowledgement of receipt, by process servers,
21 by agreed service memorialized in writing, by publication or by mail. Motions to
22 rescind or modify Criminal No-Contact Orders will be granted a hearing only
23 upon judicial determination and will be scheduled virtually where possible.
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26 5) Due to the Court's reduced ability to obtain an adequate number of jurors and
27 potential impact to the ability of attorneys and litigants to appear, the time period
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1 of the continuances implemented by this Administrative Order and Supreme
2 Court Order 25700-B-625 will be excluded periods under CrRLJ 3.3 Time for
3 Trial Rule through September 1, 2020;
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5 6) All criminal trials currently scheduled will be continued past July 6, 2020; all civil
6 trials currently scheduled will be continued past July 6, 2020;

7 7) Any out of custody criminal hearings cancelled since March 16, 2020 to include,
8 but not limited to, mandatory pre-trial, reviews, change of pleas, and trial settings
9 shall be rescheduled by summons to a later date; or scheduled by agreement of
10 the parties and assigned department;
11

12 8) Criminal out of custody arraignments cancelled since March 16, 2020 shall be
13 rescheduled by summons to a date after May 4, 2020; in custody arraignments
14 shall proceed as scheduled;

15 9) Review hearings set to determine compliance with any order issued to surrender
16 weapons, including both criminal and civil orders, will be scheduled per the usual
17 rules and practice of the court;
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19 10) Virtual hearings: if there is a request for or requirement by the court for a litigant
20 to appear virtually, the party/defendant and/or attorney is responsible for
21 providing the court good working contact information. Time of hearing for virtual
22 hearings will be the time period starting at the scheduled time and continuing four
23 (4) hours past the scheduled time. The parties are expected to continue to make
24 themselves available until their case is called. Defendants who are required to
25 appear virtually, but fail to pick up the phone or sign in virtually when their case is
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1 called, shall be treated like any other failure to appear and a bench warrant may
2 issue after the court has made reasonable attempts at reaching the party;

3 11) All in-custody matters will be handled via video conferencing until further notice;

4
5 12) Pursuant to Supreme Court Order 25700-B-625 an electronic signature shall be
6 deemed a reliable means for authentication of documents and shall have the
7 same force and effect as an original signature to a paper copy of the document
8 signed. Furthermore, pursuant to the Supreme Court Order the requirement that
9 a party who has filed electronically or has provided the clerk with their email
10 address must give consent to accept electronic transmissions from the court is
11 waived. In-person signatures of parties are not required so long as orders for
12 future court dates, any conditions of release, protection order provisions and any
13 other order of the court are on the record with the parties present. For virtual
14 hearings, per General Rule 30(d)(2)(E)(ii) the court with permission of the
15 signatories can affix acknowledgement of signatures on the documents without
16 the parties being present.
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19 13) All persons present in any courtroom in District Court, in lobby areas or in any
20 other areas of the courthouse must observe social distancing and maintain a
21 distance of at least 6 feet from any other person. All orders and rules
22 promulgated by either Clark County District Court or Clark County Superior Court
23 shall be observed in the common areas of the Clark County Courthouse. The
24 court may make hearings accessible through live streaming or members of the
25 public may request recordings of court proceedings through District Court. If
26 alternatives to public access are available and the court makes the appropriate
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1 findings under the law, the court may limit public not required to appear from
2 entering the courthouse or courtrooms until all social distancing limitations are no
3 longer recommended by order of Governor Inslee, recommendations of Centers
4 for Disease Control and/or Washington State Department of Health. The court
5 will not exclude victims in criminal matters from appearing in the courtroom;
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7 14) No person exhibiting signs of COVID-19, including fever, persistent cough or
8 shortness of breath shall be present in any courtroom and may be excluded by
9 the presiding judicial officer.
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11 For all hearings currently pending and for hearings or new cases filed during the
12 pendency of this order that are delayed pursuant to this order; such delay or
13 continuance shall constitute an excluded period pursuant to CrRLJ 3.3, CrRLJ 3.4,
14 CrRLJ 4.1, IRLJ 2.2, IRLJ 2.4, IRLJ 2.6 and any other applicable court rule.
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16 This order may impact the following Clark County District Court Local Rules: LCRLJ
17 40; LSC 4; LCrRLJ 3.2, 3.3, 3.4, 4.5; LIRLJ 2.4, 2.6.

18 The public is encouraged to continue utilizing Court services while following all
19 applicable public health guidelines.

20 The Court will review and amend or terminate this Administrative Order no later
21 than July 3, 2020.
