Well, these signs are illegal if placed on State or County or City or Private property without permission. If signs appear and are never taken down, you may contact Clark County Code Enforcement 360-397-2408 or fill out a form to report neighborhood or safety concerns at <https://clark.wa.gov/community-development/report-safety-concern>. Unclaimed signs are also a form of

litter and blight to the neighborhood. Violators can be subject to fines of \$103 per violation and/or community service.

Wishful Recycling

Effects 99 out of 100 citizens. This affliction causes people to place items in their curb side recycle bin that do not belong there. First off, Clark County does not go by the Universal Recycle Symbol or the recycle number on plastics. Not that Waste Connections does not want your stuff, it is just that they do not have



markets/vendors in our area to take your stuff. Other parts of the country might have vendors. A recent audit has revealed that roughly 20% of what people are putting in their recycle bins is (10% garbage and 10% wishful recycling). In addition, China has tightened up their restrictions in that they only want quality recyclables. To that ends we all need to pitch in and make an extra effort to adhere to **RECYCLING DONE RIGHT** guidelines. When in doubt it is best to just throw it out. Non-recyclable items in the recycle bin end up taking the long way to the landfill. That is if they are caught in time. Otherwise, they contaminate the good recyclables. In

addition, Waste Connection truck drivers make anywhere between 400 to 1200 pickup stops with the average being 800 daily. Save yourself some time and energy by only putting your recycle bins out when they are 3/4 full or more. The same applies to the glass recycle bins. School Bus Stop Rules

A new school year will be soon starting and many of our children will be riding the buses to and from school. The Washington State Patrol (WSP) would like you to take a few minutes to refresh your knowledge on how to drive safely around school buses as they are picking up and dropping off our children. The WSP has posted a video discussing rules of the road and driving safety around the school buses; when you have to stop and when you have to proceed. The School Bus Stop Rules video is posted at www.youtube.com/watch?v=moK9MZVSIQY&feature=plep The law states the \$394 fine for failure to stop for a school bus cannot be reduced, suspended or waived. If you fail to stop for a school bus you will pay the full amount. We cannot stress enough how important it is to practice safe driving, especially when children are present. 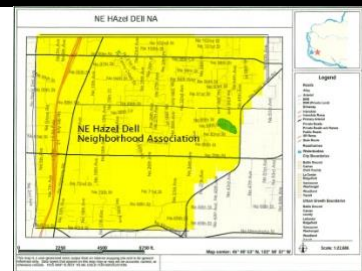
