

## Community Action Advisory Board

### Quarterly Outcomes Report: July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024

The Community Action Advisory Board advises Clark County Community Services and the Clark County Council regarding the Community Action Program (CAP) and Homeless Crisis Response System (HCRS) programs. Funds come from a combination of local, state and federal sources through the following programs: Human Services Fund (HSF), Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Consolidated Homeless Grant (CHG), Housing & Essential Needs (HEN), Emergency Housing Fund (EHF), Eviction Prevention Rental Assistance Program (EPRAP), Refugee Stabilization Funds (RSF), Deed Recording Fees, and Marriage License Fees. Each agency reports on a variety of services and outcomes related to each program. Some of these activities are reported below along with an overview of the program spending.

**Things to note about HCRS activities:** The Share Homeless Outreach program is currently billing to other grants. Any remaining state and local funds will be recaptured and used for the House Bill deficit. The LCSNW Refugee Stabilization program and the Cascade AIDS Project, Impact NW, NAYA Family Center, PICA WA, and YWCA EPRAP programs started billing to these contracts in early 2024.

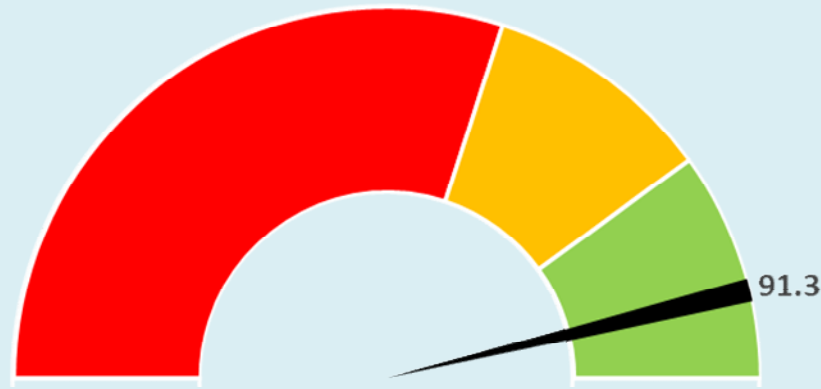

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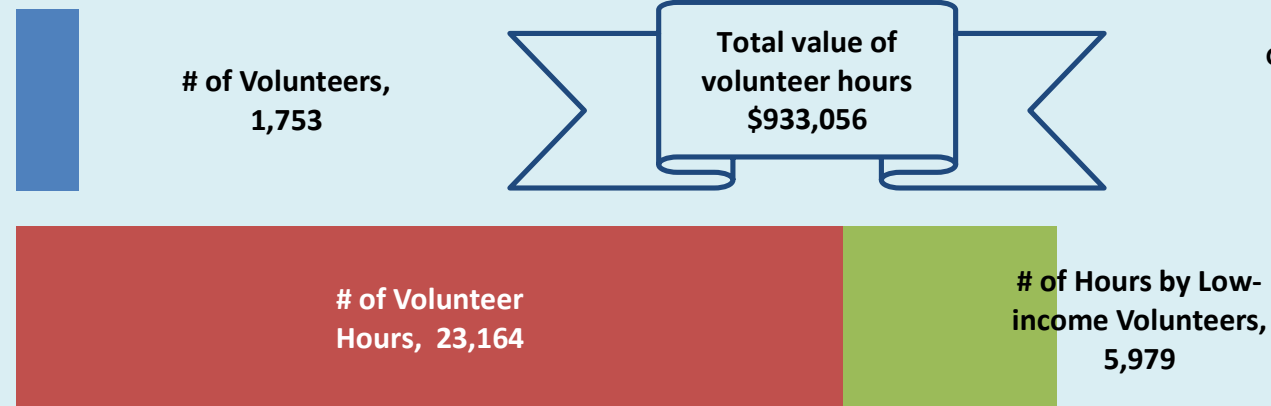
### PARTICIPANT SATISFACTION

Programs sent out **4,291** surveys to individuals and households served between July 1, 2023 and Mar 31, 2024, and received **878** responses for a **20.5%** response rate. Of the responses, **91.3%** indicated a positive overall experience.



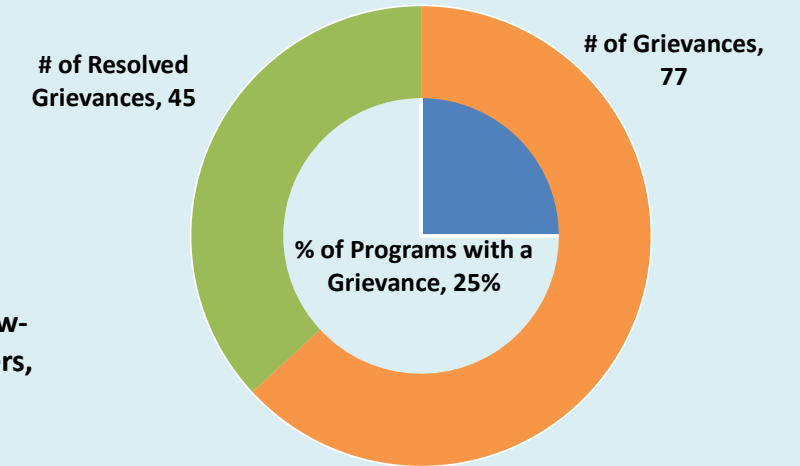
### COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Many programs rely on volunteers to operate their programs. During the reporting period, programs identified the number of people who have volunteered, the number of hours provided and when available, the number of hours volunteered by people who are low-income. The current national value of 1 volunteer hour is \$40.28.



### AGENCY GRIEVANCES

Programs are required to report the number of grievances received in their programs, along with a brief description of the grievance and the status. There are a total of 48 programs reporting grievance information.



## DEMOGRAPHICS

Demographic information is based on data collected in HMIS for Community Action Programs and the Homeless Crisis Response System.
