Quarterly Outcomes Report: July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024

The Community Action Advisory Board advises Clark County Community Services and the Clark County Council regarding the Community Action Program (CAP) and Homeless Crisis Response System (HCRS) programs. Funds come from a combination of local, state and federal sources through the following programs: Human Services Fund (HSF), Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), Consolidated Homeless Grant (CHG), Housing & Essential Needs (HEN), Emergency Housing Fund (EHF), Eviction Prevention Rental Assistance Program (EPRAP), Refugee Stabilization Funds (RSF), Deed Recording Fees, and Marriage License Fees. Each agency reports on a variety of services and outcomes related to each program. Some of these activities are reported below along with an overview of the program spending.




