ADMINISTRATIVE REQUIREMENTS - Contractors shall comply with all management and administrative requirements established by Washington Administrative Code (WAC), the Revised Code of the State of Washington (RCW), and any subsequent amendments or modifications, as applicable to providers licensed in the State of Washington.

ALL proposals submitted become the property of Clark County. It is understood and agreed that the prospective Proposer claims no proprietary rights to the ideas and written materials contained in or attached to the proposal submitted. Clark County has the right to reject or accept proprietary information.

AUTHORSHIP - Applicants must identify any assistance provided by agencies or individuals outside the proposers own organization in preparing the proposal. No contingent fees for such assistance will be allowed to be paid under any contract resulting from this RFP.

CANCELLATION OF AWARD - Clark County reserves the right to immediately cancel an award if the contractual agreement has not been entered into by both parties or if new state regulations or policy make it necessary to change the program purpose or content, discontinue such programs, or impose funding reductions. In those cases where negotiation of contract activities are necessary, Clark County reserves the right to limit the period of negotiation to sixty (60) days after which time funds may be unencumbered.

CONFIDENTIALLY - Proposer shall comply with all applicable state and federal laws governing the confidentiality of information.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST - All proposals submitted must contain a statement disclosing or denying any interest, financial or otherwise, that any employee or official of Clark County or the appropriate Advisory Board may have in the proposing agency or proposed project.

CONSORTIUM OF AGENCIES - Any consortium of companies or agencies submitting a proposal must certify that each company or agency of the consortium can meet the requirements set forth in the RFP.

COST OF PROPOSAL & AWARD - The contract award will not be final until Clark County and the prospective contractor have executed a contractual agreement. The contractual agreement consists of the following parts: (a) the basic provisions and general terms and conditions, (b) the special terms and conditions, (c) the project description and goals (Statement of Work), and (d) the budget and payment terms. Clark County is not responsible for any costs incurred prior to the effective date of the contract. Clark County reserves the right to make an award without further negotiation of the proposal submitted. Therefore, the proposal should be submitted in final form from a budgetary, technical, and programmatic standpoint.

DISPUTES - Clark County encourages the use of informal resolution to address complaints or disputes arising over any actions in implementing the provisions of this RFP. Written complaints should be addressed to Clark County – Purchasing, P.O. Box 5000, Vancouver, Washington 98666-5000.

independently, without consultation, communication, or agreement for the purpose of restricting competition. This does not preclude or impede the formation of a consortium of companies and/or agencies for purposes of engaging in jointly sponsored proposals.

INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT - Clark County has made this RFP subject to Washington State statute RCW 39.34. Therefore, the proposer may, at the proposers option, extend identical prices and services to other public agencies wishing to participate in this RFP. Each public agency wishing to utilize this RFP will issue a purchase order (or contract) binding only their agency. Each contract is between the proposer and the individual agency with no. liability to Clark County.

LIMITATION - This RFP does not commit Clark County to award a contract, to pay any costs incurred in the preparation of a response to this RFP, or to procure or contract for services or supplies.

LATE PROPOSALS - A proposal received after the date and time indicated above will not be accepted. No exceptions will be made.

ORAL PRESENTATIONS - An oral presentation may be required of those prospective contractors whose proposals are under consideration. Prospective contractors may be informed that an oral presentation is desired and will be notified of the date, time and location the oral presentation is to be conducted.

OTHER AUDIT/MONITORING REQUIREMENTS - In addition, auditing or monitoring for the following purposes will be conducted at the discretion of Clark County: Fund accountability; Contract compliance; and Program performance.

PRICE WARRANT - The proposer shall warrant that the costs quoted for services in response to the RFP are not in excess of those which would be charged any other individual or entity for the same services performed by the prospective contractor, in a similar socioeconomic, geographical region.

PROTESTS - Must be submitted to the Purchasing Department.

PUBLIC SAFETY - May require limiting access to public work sites, public facilities, and public offices, sometimes without advance notice. The successful Proposer's employees and agents shall carry sufficient identification to show by whom they are employed and display it upon request to security personnel. County project managers have discretion to require the successful Proposer's employees and agents to be escorted to and from any public office, facility or work site if national or local security appears to require it.

ACCEPTANCE or REJECTION OF PROPOSALS - Clark County reserves the right to accept or reject any or all proposals received as a result of this RFP, to negotiate with any or all prospective contractors on modifications to proposals, to waive formalities, to postpone award, or to cancel in part or in its entirety this RFP if it is in the best interest of Clark County to do so.

SUBCONTRACTING - No activities or services included as a part of this proposal may be subcontracted to another organization, firm, or individual without the approval of Clark County. Such intent to subcontract shall be clearly identified in the proposal. It is understood that the contractor is held responsible for the satisfactory accomplishment of the service or activities included in a subcontract.

VERBAL PROPOSALS - Verbal proposals will not be considered in making the award of any contract as a result of this RFP.

WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE – The contractor shall comply with R.C.W. Title 51- with minimum coverage limits of \$500,000 for each accident, or provide evidence that State law does not require such coverage.

2. Background	Clark County Public Health responds, mitigates, and supports recovery efforts regarding disease outbreaks, food borne illness outbreaks, toxic spills, biologic events, natural disasters, and other public health threats.
	To support and coordinate effective public health response, The Clark County Public Health Incident Management Team respond to emergencies and threats using the National Incident Management System. Select staff are trained to perform in command and general staff roles and as agency administrators.
	Clark County Public Health develops Incident Management Team competencies through training and exercise. Clark County desires to contract with multiple qualified contractors to perform as the Incident Commander in the event of a public health emergency or disaster, participate in at least 2 (two) trainings annually and serve as a mentor for developing Incident Commanders.
	Clark County is the southernmost county in the Washington state. The population was 503,311 as of the 2020 census, making it the fifth most populated county in Washington, is a boarder county situated across the Columbia River from Portland, Oregon, and is situated as a border county to Multnomah, Washington, and Clackamas Counties in Oregon.
	Clark County Public Health is designated under Washington State Department of Health to serve as the regional lead agency for Emergency Preparedness and Response Region 4. Region 4 includes local health jurisdictions in Clark, Cowlitz, Skamania, and Wahkiakum counties. Clark County Public Health collaborates and coordinates emergency planning and response efforts with local public health response coordinators in Region 4.
	Additionally, Clark County Public Health leads the Health Care Alliance for SW Washington a healthcare coalition which includes hospital and healthcare facilities in Region 4 in addition to Klickitat County. Members of the Healthcare Alliance include critical partners such as;

	emergency management, local emergency response managers, hospitals, long term care facilities, and community-based organizations serving vulnerable populations.

2. Incident Management Team Support

Qualified contractors will be called upon to serve in the Incident Commander position, the Safety Officer position and any other vacant position on the Incident Management Team (IMT) when activated to respond to a public health threat. The contractor(s) will work with the Agency Administrator, Subject Matter Experts, and Command and General staff to carry out the Delegation of Responsibility for the incident using county tools and systems. The Incident Commander (IC) is responsible for the overall management of the incident and determines which Command and General Staff positions to staff in order to maintain a manageable span of control and ensure appropriate attention to the necessary incident management functions.

The Contractor will:

- Report directly to the Agency Administrator and/or Public Health Department Director during response.
- Execute the Delegation of Responsibility consistent with the National Incident Management System.
- Use Region 4 All Hazards Response Plans as guidance for the activation, management and demobilization of Incident Management Team objectives.
- Serve in the role of the Safety Officer and any other vacant command and general staff positions.
- Understand and support the role of the Equity and Inclusion Officer, a new position on the public health IMT.
- Rely on designated public health subject matter experts to support sound response objectives and tactics.
- Facilitate in action reviews every two weeks to support improvements and efficient operations.
- Support Emergency Preparedness and Response manager to facilitate an after action review as part of the demobilization process.
- Maintain a valid driver's license.
- Conduct work activities in compliance with County's professional standards of conduct.

- Notify County of availability on a monthly basis.
- Respond to County requests to support emergency response activation within 4 hours.
- Perform in the position of Incident Commander for Clark County Public Health
- Complete and maintain required process, procedures and documentation throughout the incident.
- Serve as Safety Officer

All insurance coverage maintained or procured pursuant to this agreement shall be endorsed to waive subrogation against County, its elected or appointed officers, agents, officials, employees and volunteers or shall specifically allow Contractor or others providing insurance evidence in compliance with these specifications to waive their right of subrogation prior to a loss. Contractor hereby waives its own right of subrogation against County and shall require similar written express waivers and insurance clauses from each of its subcontractors.

B. Proof of Insurance

Proof of Insurance shall be provided prior to the starting of the contract performance. Proof will be on an ACORD Certificate(s) of Liability Insurance, which the Proposer shall provide to Clark County. Each certificate will show the coverage, deductible and policy period. Policies shall be endorsed to state that coverage will not be suspended, voided, canceled or reduced without a 30-day written notice by mail to the County. It is the Proposers responsibility to provide evidence of continuing coverage during the overlap periods of the policy and the contract.

C. Worker's Compensation

As required by the industrial insurance laws of the State of Washington.

D. Automobile

If the Proposer or its employees use motor vehicles in conducting activities under this Contract, liability insurance covering bodily injury and property damage shall be provided by the Proposer through a commercial automobile insurance policy. The policy shall cover all owned and nonowned vehicles. Such insurance shall have minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, combined single limit for bodily injury liability and property damage liability with a \$1,000,000 annual aggregate limit. If the Proposer does not use motor vehicles in conducting activities under this Contract, then written confirmation to that effect on Proposer letterhead shall be submitted by the Proposer.

E. Commercial General Liability (CGL) Insurance

Written under ISO Form CG0001 or its latest equivalent with minimum limits of \$2,000,000 per occurrence and in the aggregate for each one-year policy period. Personal and Advertising Injury \$1,000,000 and General Aggregate \$2,000,000. This policy must renew annually. This coverage may be any combination of primary, umbrella or excess liability coverage affording total liability limits of not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence and in the aggregate. However, if other policies are added they must be a follow-form policy in language, renewal date, and have no more exclusions than the underlying coverage. Coverage shall not contain any endorsement(s) excluding nor limiting Product/Completed Operations, Contractual Liability or Cross Liability. Clark County needs to be listed as additional insured.

F. Professional Liability (aka Errors and Omissions)

The Proposer shall obtain, at Proposers expense, and keep in force during the term of this contract Professional Liability insurance policy to protect against legal liability arising out of contract activity. Such insurance shall provide a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence. The deductible will not be more than \$25,000 unless prior arrangements are made with Clark County on a case-by-case basis; the criterion is the Proposers liquidity and ability to pay from its own resources. It should be an "Occurrence Form" policy. If the policy is "Claims Made", then Extended Reporting Period Coverage (Tail coverage) shall be purchased for three (3) years after the end of the contract.

G. Umbrella Liability Coverage

Umbrella Coverage in the amount of \$1,000,000 shall be provided and will apply over all liability policies without exception, including Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability.

H. Additional Insured

Clark County, its officers, employees and agents, will be named on all policies of contractor and any subcontractors as an additional insured, with no restrictions or limitations concerning products and completed operations. This coverage shall be primary coverage and noncontributory to any coverage maintained by Clark County. The contractor shall provide Clark County with verification of insurance and endorsements required by this agreement. Clark County reserves the right to require complete, certified copies of all required insurance policies at any time. All insurance shall be obtained from an insurance company authorized to do business in the State of Washington.

All policies must have a Best's Rating of A-VII or better.

The Contractor specifically confirms and warrants that it has commercial general liability insurance with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$2,000,000 annual aggregate for bodily injury and property damage. The deductible will not be more than \$50,000 unless prior arrangements are made with Clark County on a case-by-case basis; the criterion is the Contractor's liquidity and ability to pay from its own resources regardless of coverage status due to cancellation, reservation of rights, or other no-coverage-enforce reason.
- 17.2. <u>Professional Liability</u>. The Contractor shall obtain, at Contractor's expense, and keep in force during the term of this contract Professional Liability insurance policy to protect against legal liability arising out of its errors and omissions. Such insurance shall provide a minimum of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$1,000,000 annual aggregate. The deductible will not be more than \$25,000 unless prior arrangements are

made with Clark County on a case-by-case basis; the criterion is the Contractor's liquidity and ability to pay from its own resources. It should be an "Occurrence Form" policy. If the policy is "Claims Made", then Extended Reporting Period Coverage (Tail coverage) shall be purchased for three (3) years after the end of the contract term. At all times, Contractor's policy, limits, and coverage will be primary and non-contributory as respect to the Contractor.

- 17.3. <u>Automobile</u>. If the Contractor or its employees use motor vehicles in conducting activities under this Contract, liability insurance covering bodily injury and property damage shall be provided by the Contractor through a commercial automobile insurance policy. The policy shall cover all hired, owned, and non-owned vehicles. Such insurance shall have minimum limits of \$1,000,000 per occurrence, combined single limit for bodily injury liability and property damage liability with a \$1,000,000 annual aggregate limit. If vehicles are not used, Contractor shall, on letterhead, provide a letter to County stating the same.
- 17.4. <u>Primary and Non-Contributory</u>. Contractor's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as it relates to County, its officers, agents, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by County, its officers, employees, or volunteers shall be excess of Contractor's insurance and shall not contribute with it in any way.
- 17.5. <u>Waiver of Subrogation</u>. All insurance coverage maintained or procured pursuant to this contract shall be endorsed to waive subrogation against County, its elected or appointed officers, agents, officials, employees, and volunteers or shall specifically allow Contractor or others providing insurance evidence in compliance with these specifications to waive their right of recovery prior to a loss. Contractor hereby waives its own right of recovery against County, and if applicable, shall require similar written express waivers and insurance clauses from each of its subcontractors.
- 17.6. Worker's Compensation. As required by the industrial insurance laws of the State of Washington.
- 17.7. Proof of Insurance. The Contractor shall provide ACORD certificate(s) which includes the requirements listed above and shall assure that Clark County is listed as an additional insured. All policies must have a Best's Rating of A-VII or better. Failure to provide County proof of insurance within fifteen (15) days upon Contract execution is agreed by both parties to be a material breach of his Contract and may result in termination of this Contract pursuant to Paragraph four (4) above.
- 18. <u>Consent and Understanding</u>. This contract contains a complete and integrated understanding of the Contract between the parties and supersedes any understandings, contract, or negotiations,

whether oral or written, not set forth herein or in written amendments hereto duly executed by both parties.

- 19. Force Majeure. Neither party will be liable for failure or delay to perform obligations under this Contract, which have become practicably impossible because of circumstances beyond the reasonable control of the applicable party. Such circumstances include without limitation natural disasters or acts of God; acts of terrorism; labor disputes or stoppages; war; government acts or orders; epidemics, pandemics, or outbreak of communicable disease; quarantines; national or regional emergencies; or any other cause, whether similar in kind to the foregoing or otherwise, beyond the party's reasonable control. Written notice of a party's failure or delay in performance due to force majeure must be given to the other party no later than five (5) business days following the force majeure event commencing, which notice shall describe the force majeure event and the actions taken to minimize the impact thereof. All delivery dates under this Contract affected by force majeure shall be tolled for the duration of such force majeure. The parties hereby agree, when feasible, not to cancel but reschedule the pertinent obligations and deliverables for mutually agreed dates as soon as practicable after the force majeure condition ceases to exist.
- 20. <u>Debarment or Exclusion</u>. The Contractor certifies that it is not presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participating in any federally funded program by any federal department or agency (Excluded Person) and that no owner, director, officer, or partner with an ownership or control interest in the Contractor is an Excluded Person. In addition, Contractor certifies that no employee or subcontractor of Contractor who will perform work (whether directly or indirectly) under this Contract is an Excluded Person.
- 21. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this contract is held invalid, the remainder would then continue to conform to the terms and requirements of applicable law.

STATEMENT OF WORK

1. Background/Purpose

Clark County Public Health responds, mitigates, and supports recovery efforts regarding disease outbreaks, food borne illness outbreaks, toxic spills, biologic events, natural disasters, and other public health threats.

To support and coordinate effective public health response, The Clark County Public Health Incident Management Team respond to emergencies and threats using the National Incident Management System. Select staff are trained to perform in command and general staff roles and as agency administrators.

Clark County Public Health develops Incident Management Team competencies through training and exercise. Clark County desires to contract with multiple qualified contractors to perform as the Incident Commander in the event of a public health emergency or disaster, participate in at least 2 (two) trainings annually and serve as a mentor for developing Incident Commanders.

Clark County is the southernmost county in the Washington state. The population was 503,311 as of the 2020 census, making it the fifth most populated county in Washington, is a boarder county situated across the Columbia River from Portland, Oregon, and is situated as a border county to Multnomah, Washington, and Clackamas Counties in Oregon.

Clark County Public Health is designated under Washington State Department of Health to serve as the regional lead agency for Emergency Preparedness and Response Region 4. Region 4 includes local health jurisdictions in Clark, Cowlitz, Skamania, and Wahkiakum counties. Clark County Public Health collaborates and coordinates emergency planning and response efforts with local public health response coordinators in Region 4.

Additionally, Clark County Public Health leads the Health Care Alliance for SW Washington a healthcare coalition which includes hospital and healthcare facilities in Region 4 in addition to Klickitat County. Members of the Healthcare Alliance include critical partners such as; emergency management, local emergency response managers, hospitals, long term care facilities, and community-based organizations serving vulnerable populations.

2. Mandatory/Minimum Requirements

2.1. Mandatory Requirements

- **2.1.1.** Must have FEMA ICS training certification.
- **2.1.2.** FEMA certified to serve as a Type 2 Incident Commander.
- **2.1.3.** FEMA certified to serve as the Safety Officer.
- **2.1.4.** Must have robust internet connectivity to support virtual and or hybrid work environments.
- **2.1.5.** Must coordinate and secure all travel related arrangement and expenses.
- **2.1.6.** Must provide a monthly invoice by the 25th of the month, and if backup documentation is provided, may bill the agency for travel expenses. Mileage must be documented with date and addresses to and from the Center for Community Health and will be reimbursed at the current federal IRS mileage reimbursement rate.

2.2. Preferred Experience:

2.2.1. Responding to actual public health threats.

Examples include:

preventable disease outbreaks, hospital and healthcare evacuations, food borne illness outbreaks, natural disasters, anthrax and/or other biologic agents.

3. Scope of Work

3.1. Clark County Public Health Onboarding

Qualified contractors will complete an onboarding process within the first 15 days of executing a contract. Onboarding will include tasks and activities that will acclimate contractor(s) to public health, staff, policies and procedures, response plans, and tools.

3.1.1 Outcomes

- a) Review applicable Clark County Public Health policies and procedures.
- b) Review Health Officer and public health statutory requirements and authorities
- c) Review Clark County's Professional Standards of Conduct
- d) Review the Region 4 All Hazards Response Plans
- e) Orientation to tools, systems, and communication methodologies.
- f) Meet with department leadership and public health emergency preparedness and response team.
- g) Complete on site walk through and tour.

3.2 Incident Management Team Support

Qualified contractors will be called upon to serve in the Incident Commander position, the Safety Officer position and any other vacant position on the Incident Management Team (IMT) when activated to respond to a public health threat. The contractor(s) will work with the Agency Administrator, Subject Matter Experts, and Command and General staff to carry out the Delegation of Responsibility for the incident using county tools and systems. The Incident Commander (IC) is responsible for the overall management of the incident and determines which Command and General Staff positions to staff in order to maintain a manageable span of control and ensure appropriate attention to the necessary incident management functions.

3.2.1 The Contractor will:

- Report directly to the Agency Administrator and/or Public Health Department Director during response.
- Execute the Delegation of Responsibility consistent with the National Incident Management System.
- c) Use Region 4 All Hazards Response Plans as guidance for the activation, management and demobilization of Incident Management Team objectives.
- d) Serve in the role of the Safety Officer and any other vacant command and general staff positions.
- e) Understand and support the role of the Equity and Inclusion Officer, a new position on the public health IMT.
- f) Rely on designated public health subject matter experts to support sound response objectives and tactics.
- g) Facilitate in action reviews every two weeks to support improvements and efficient operations.
- h) Support Emergency Preparedness and Response manager to facilitate an after action review as part of the demobilization process.
- i) Maintain a valid driver's license.

 j) Conduct work activities in compliance with County's professional standards of conduct.

3.2.2 Outcomes

- a) Notify County of availability on a monthly basis.
- b) Respond to County requests to support emergency response activation within 4 hours.
- c) Perform in the position of Incident Commander for Clark County Public Health
- d) Complete and maintain required process, procedures and documentation throughout the incident.
- e) Serve as Safety Officer
- f) Complete in action review every two weeks during response.
- g) Facilitate demobilization process including the collecting of feedback for a final after action review and/or hotwash session.

3.3 Training

Contractors are expected to attend at least two (2) training or exercise activities annually.

3.4 IMT Command and General Staff Mentorship

Contractor will serve as a mentor and technical support for County Directors, leaders, managers, the Public Health Emergency Preparedness and Response staff, and the Command and General staff.

3.4.1 Outcomes

- a) Participate in at least 2 (two) trainings and/or exercises annually with the Clark County Public Health Incident Management Team.
- b) Attend two leadership and/or management team meetings annually to provide input and support on CCPH initiatives to expand IMT response capabilities.
- c) Be available as a subject matter expert for ad hoc questions via email to support, clarify and mentor designated County staff.
- d) Provide input and technical guidance on response process and protocols.

- 1. Access, Monitoring, and Inspections. Applicable for contracts that impact public fees.
 - 1.1. Contractor agrees to cooperate and participate in the County's monitoring and evaluation process. The Contractor shall furnish documents, reports, statements, records, data, and other information to the County, state, federal, or other funding agencies at such times and on such forms as are specified by the County. This may include agreements the Contractor has with other entities.
 - 1.2. Contractor grants the County the right of access to examine or transcribe any records, books, financial statements, papers, and documents relating to this Contract. The Contractor's records, books, financial statements, papers, and documents, with respect to all matters, shall be subject at all times to inspection, review, or audit by the County, federal, or state officials during the performance of a Contract with the County and during the period of document retention.
- 2. <u>Fair Housing and Non-discrimination</u>. Applicable for contracts that involve participant housing, including isolation and quarantine facilities.
 - 2.1. The Contractor shall comply with all local, state, and federal fair housing and non-discrimination laws, regulations, and policies. Contractor shall take necessary and appropriate actions to prevent discrimination in rental units assisted through the contracted funding sources.
 - 2.2. In accordance with the decision in United States v. Windsor, 133 S. Ct. 2675 (June 26, 2013), and section 3 of the Defense of Marriage Act, codified at 1 USC 7, in any grant-related activity in which family, marital, or household considerations are, by statute or regulation, relevant for purposes of determining beneficiary eligibility or participation, grantees must treat same-sex spouses, marriages, and households on the same terms as opposite sex spouses, marriages, and households, respectively.

 - 3.5.1.1. A copy of an approved "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wages" required by RCW 39.12.040. The County will make no payment under this Contract for the Work performed until this statement has been approved by L&I and a copy of the approved form has been provided.
 - 3.5.1.2. A copy of an approved "Affidavit of Prevailing Wages Paid", required by RCW 39.12.040. The Contracting Agency will not grant Completion (acceptance of the contract) until all approved Affidavit of Wages paid for Contractor and all Subcontractors have been received. The Contracting Agency will not release to the Contractor any funds retained under RCW 60.28.011 until all of the "Affidavit of Prevailing Wages Paid" forms have been approved by L&I and a copy of all the approved forms provided.
 - 3.5.1.3. The contractors and subcontractors must submit certified payroll records to L&I as required by RCW 39.12.120.
 - 3.5.1.4. The Contractor shall be responsible for any form filing fees required by L&I.
- 3.6. Prevailing Wage Unit-priced Contract.
 - 3.6.1. <u>Time</u>. The contract term shall not exceed one (1) year. The county reserves the right to extend the contract for an additional one (1) year period, with the same terms and conditions, by service of a written notice of its intention to do so prior to the contract termination date.
- 4. <u>Federal Certifications and Assurances</u>. Applicable for contracts (not subaward) that use \$0.01 or greater of federal funds 2 C.F.R. § 200.326 and 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Appendix II
 - 4.1. Equal Employment Opportunity
 - 4.1.1. The contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity,

or national origin. The contractor will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed, and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to their race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: Employment, upgrading, demotion, or transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship. The contractor agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices to be provided by the contracting officer setting forth the provisions of this nondiscrimination clause.

The contractor will not discharge or in any other manner discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant has inquired about, discussed, or disclosed the compensation of the employee or applicant or another employee or applicant. This provision shall not apply to instances in which an employee who has access to the compensation information of other employees or applicants as a part of such employee's essential job functions discloses the compensation of such other employees or applicants to individuals who do not otherwise have access to such information, unless such disclosure is in response to a formal complaint or charge, in furtherance of an investigation, proceeding, hearing, or action, including an investigation conducted by the employer, or is consistent with the contractor's legal duty to furnish information.
- 4.1.4. The contractor will send to each labor union or representative of workers with which it has a collective bargaining agreement or other contract or understanding, a notice to be provided by the agency contracting officer, advising the labor union or workers' representative of the contractor's commitments under section 202 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and shall post copies of the notice in conspicuous places available to employees and applicants for employment.
- 4.1.5. The contractor will comply with all provisions of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and of the rules, regulations, and relevant orders of the Secretary of Labor.
- 4.1.6. The contractor will furnish all information and reports required by Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and by the rules, regulations, and orders of the Secretary of Labor, or pursuant thereto, and will permit access to his books, records, and accounts by the contracting agency and the Secretary of Labor for purposes of investigation to ascertain compliance with such rules, regulations, and orders.
- 4.1.7. In the event of the contractor's non-compliance with the nondiscrimination clauses of this contract or with any of such rules, regulations, or orders, this contract may be canceled, terminated or suspended in whole or in part and the contractor may be declared ineligible for further Government contracts in accordance with procedures authorized in Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, and such other sanctions may be imposed and remedies invoked as provided in Executive Order

- 11246 of September 24, 1965, or by rule, regulation, or order of the Secretary of Labor, or as otherwise provided by law.
- 4.1.8. The contractor will include the provisions of paragraphs (1.1) through (1.8) in every subcontract or purchase order unless exempted by rules, regulations, or orders of the Secretary of Labor issued pursuant to section 204 of Executive Order 11246 of September 24, 1965, so that such provisions will be binding upon each subcontractor or vendor. The contractor will take such action with respect to any subcontract or purchase order as may be directed by the Secretary of Labor as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: Provided, however, that in the event the contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or vendor as a result of such direction, the contractor may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.

4.2. Davis Bacon Act and Copeland Anti-Kickback Act

Parts 3 and 5, governing the payment of wages and the ratio of apprentices and trainees to journeymen; provided that if wage rates higher than those required under such regulations are imposed by state or local law, nothing hereunder is intended to relieve the Contractor of its obligation, if any, of the requirements of 29 C.F.R. §5.5.
- 4.2.2. In addition to the federal wage rate requirements referenced in the section above, Washington state law (RCW 39.12) also contains standards for determining when a project is a public work for the purposes of state law and the payment of prevailing wage rates. By signing this Contract, the Contractor agrees to defend and hold the County harmless from any claims based on alleged failure to pay prevailing wages.
- 4.2.3. The Contractor shall be responsible for the payment of prevailing wages, if applicable, and will demonstrate its compliance by uploading the following documents to the Washington Department of Labor and Industries web portal:
 - 4.2.3.1. A "Statement of Intent to Pay Prevailing Wage" at the start of the project.
 - 4.2.3.2. An "Affidavit of Wages Paid" at the end of the project with the final payment request. The County may withhold final payment on the project until such time as both documents have been received.
- 4.2.4. The contractor shall comply with 18 U.S.C. § 874, 40 U.S.C. § 3145, and the requirements of 29 C.F.R. pt. 3 as may be applicable, which are incorporated by reference into this contract.
- 4.2.5. The contractor shall insert in any subcontracts the clause above and such other clauses as the FEMA may by appropriate instructions require, and also a clause requiring the subcontractors to include these clauses in any lower tier subcontracts.

The prime contractor shall be responsible for the compliance by any subcontractor or lower tier subcontractor with all of these contract clauses.

Such liquidated damages shall be computed with respect to each individual laborer or mechanic, including watchmen and guards, employed in violation of the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section, in the sum of \$10 for each calendar day on which such individual was required or permitted to work in excess of the standard workweek of forty hours without payment of the overtime wages required by the clause set forth in paragraph (1) of this section.
 - 4.3.3. Withholding for unpaid wages and liquidated damages. Clark County Public Health) shall upon its own action or upon written request of an authorized representative of the Department of Labor withhold or cause to be withheld, from any moneys payable on account of work performed by the contractor or subcontractor under any such contract or any other Federal contract with the same prime contractor, or any other federally-assisted contract subject to the Contract Work Hours and Safety Standards Act, which is held by the same prime contractor, such sums as may be determined to be necessary to satisfy any liabilities of such contractor or subcontractor for unpaid wages and liquidated damages as provided in the clause set forth in paragraph (2) of this section.
 - 4.3.4. Each contract in an amount greater than \$100,000 that is entered into under legislation subject to Reorganization Plan Numbered 14 of 1950 (eff. May 24, 1950, 64 Stat. 1267) and is for construction, alteration, and repair, including painting and decorating, must provide that no contractor or subcontractor contracting for any part of the contract work shall require any laborer or mechanic employed in the performance of the contract to work in surroundings or under working conditions that are unsanitary, hazardous, or dangerous to health or safety, as established under construction safety and health standards the Secretary of Labor prescribes by regulation based on proceedings pursuant to section 553 of title 5, provided that the

 - 4.4.2.1. The contractor agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 U.S.C. 1251 et seq.
 - 4.4.2.2. The contractor agrees to report each violation to the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) and understands and agrees that the (name of the state agency or local or Indian tribal government) will, in turn, report each violation as required to assure notification to the (name of recipient), Federal Emergency Management Agency, and the appropriate Environmental Protection Agency Regional Office.
 - 4.4.2.3. The contractor agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$150,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FEMA.

4.5. Debarment and Suspension

- 4.9. Federal Seal, Logo, and Flags
 - 4.9.1. The contractor shall not use federal seal(s), logos, crests, or reproductions of flags or likenesses of federal agency officials without specific pre-approval.
- 4.10. Compliance with Federal Law, Regulations, and Executive Orders
