Exciting News!

- Clean Water submitted 4 grant applications to Department of Ecology in October for Water Quality Combined Grant Funding.
- Every year Ecology shares their initial recommendation for funding through a DRAFT Offer list.
- I am excited to announce that all 4 of our applications were recommended for funding in the DRAFT Offer List!
- **Next Steps:**
 - The final funding allocation is approved through the Washington State Legislatures final 2025-2027 biennial budget. The final funding award announcement is expected in July 2025.
 - Please note that our final ability to receive these funds is contingent on the following:
 - County GMA compliance (*note: stormwater facility projects are not eligible for funding if County is out of compliance with GMA*).
 - Washington State Legislature approval
 - Changes to federal funding availability

The Cougar 3 Enhancement Project reconnects the incised Cougar Creek channel to its floodplain using valley spanning wood structures, increases wetland and riparian habitat, and reduces bank erosion. Cougar Creek is a tributary to Salmon Creek, an anadromous fish-bearing stream with ongoing TMDLs. The existing Cougar Creek channel is confined, straightened, and disconnected from its floodplain. Its OWQI status is poor, however trends analysis shows that it has improved over that last 20 years.

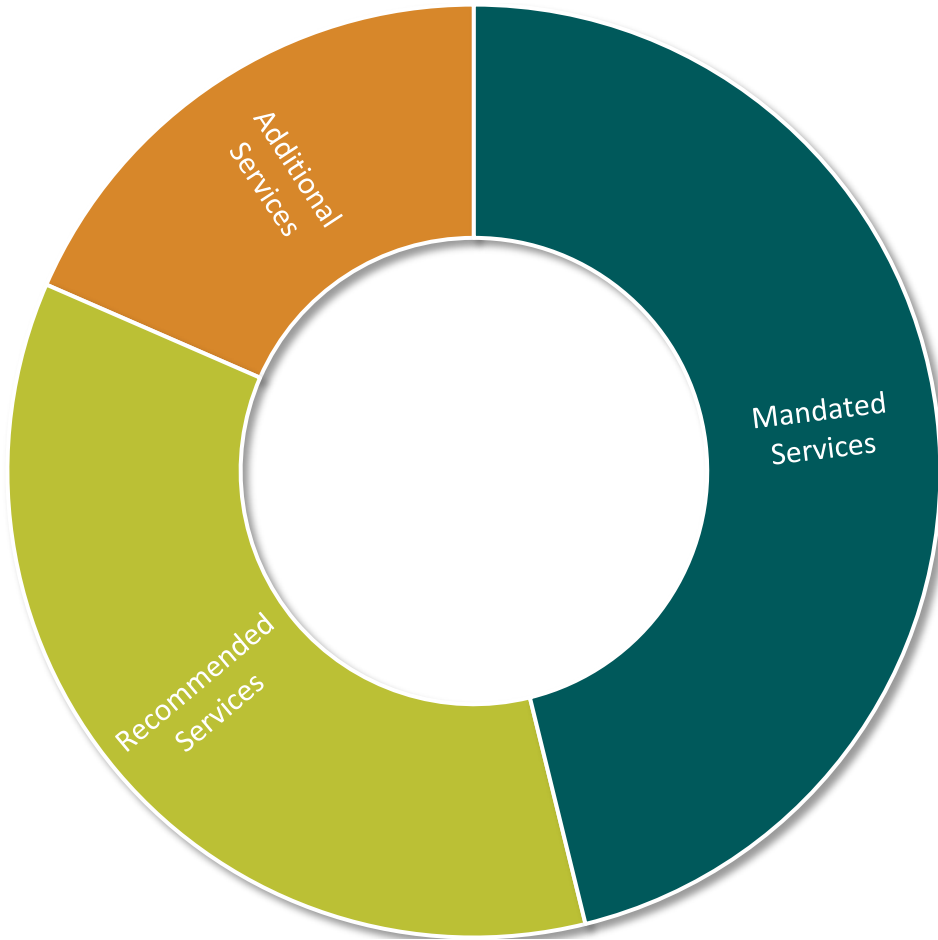

Summary of Impacts to Ratepayers

10 most impacted ratepayers/property owners in the following categories.

1. **Clark County ratepayers** (by fund, department, division).
2. **Non-residential ratepayers** (ex. Commercial, non-profits, governments etc.).
3. **Multi-family residential ratepayers** (Properties with more than one dwelling/housing unit).



Impacts to Clark County *(by fund, department, division)*

The 2025 Clean Water Fee increase has the greatest impact on the Public Works Department.

- i. The Road Fund is the most impacted with an estimated fee increase of approx. \$2.19M annually.
- ii. The Public Works Operations Center is the second most impacted PW’s property with an annual fee increase of \$25,685.
- iii. Parks & Nature is the third most impacted PWs Department with an annual fee increase of \$21,722.49.

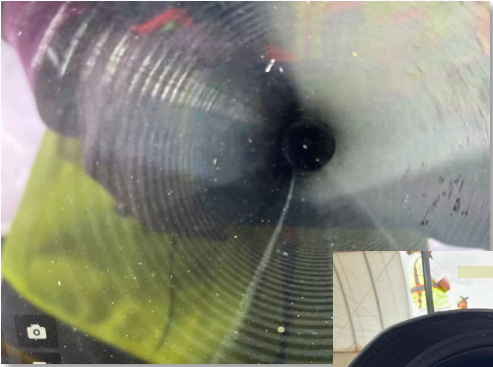
