#### MAKE SURE YOUR VOTE COUNTS.

The voting instructions for this election are unique and by understanding them thoroughly you will make sure your vote counts.

#### **Voting Instructions:**

- 1) Your ballot must be voted in secret and shown to no one.
- 2) Use a black or blue ink pen to mark your ballot by completely filling in the box to the left of your choice(s).
- 3) Vote for only one choice for each office or ballot measure. Unless specifically allowed by law, more than one vote for an office or ballot measure will be an overvote and no votes for that office or ballot measure will be counted.
- 4) To vote for a person not appearing on the ballot, completely fill in the box to the left of the "Write-in" choice and use the line provided for their name.
- 5) If you make a mistake when voting, completely cross out the name of the candidate or choice you do not want. You then have the option of making another choice.
