Use a blue or black pen to completely fill in the box to the left of your choice.

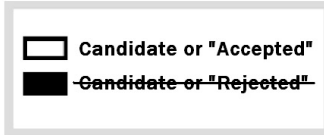
Vote for one choice for each contest or ballot measure. If you vote for more than one choice for that contest or ballot measure, no votes will be counted for that contest or ballot measure.

**WHEN RETURNING YOUR BALLOT**

Put a first class stamp (\$0.49) on the envelope and mail it on or before election day, Tuesday, November 4. Your ballot must be postmarked no later than election day, so check the pick-up schedule on the mail box or confirm election day hours with the post office.

If you return your ballot to a drop site location, it must be returned by 8:00 PM on Tuesday, November 4, for it to be counted.

**Initiative Measure No. 1351**

Initiative Measure No. 1351 concerns K-12 education. This measure would direct the legislature to allocate funds to reduce class sizes and increase staffing support for students in all K-12 grades, with additional class-size reductions and staffing increases in high-poverty schools.

**Initiative Measure No. 591**

Initiative Measure No. 591 concerns firearms. This measure would prohibit government agencies from confiscating guns or other firearms from citizens without due process, or from requiring background checks on firearm recipients unless a uniform national standard is required.

**City of Washougal  
 Proposition No. 5**  
 Replacement Levy for Fire and  
 Emergency Medical Services

The City Council of the City of Washougal adopted Resolution 1092 concerning renewing an increase in Washougal's regular property tax levy for fire and emergency medical services.

To fund fire and emergency medical services, this proposition authorizes an increase in the City of Washougal's regular tax levy for collection in 2015 of ten cents (\$0.10) per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. If this proposition is approved the City's total 2015 regular levy rate will not exceed \$2.85 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation. Levy amounts in the five years following 2015 will be limited as provided under RCW chapter 84.55.
