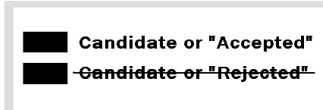

**Initiative Measure No. 1433**

Initiative Measure No. 1433 concerns labor standards. This measure would increase the state minimum wage to \$11.00 in 2017, \$11.50 in 2018, \$12.00 in 2019, and \$13.50 in 2020, require employers to provide paid sick leave, and adopt related laws.

**City of Vancouver**  
**Proposition No. 1**  
 Very Low-Income Housing Levy

The City of Vancouver Council adopted Resolution No. M-3895 concerning property taxes for very low-income housing assistance. This proposition would fund housing and housing services for people with very low-incomes, including those with disabilities, veterans, seniors, and families with children by authorizing a regular property tax levy, within the City of Vancouver taxing district, generating \$6,000,000 annually (approximately \$0.36/\$1,000 assessed value) under RCW 84.52.105, for seven years. All levy proceeds will be used for the purposes specified in the Vancouver Affordable Housing Fund Administrative and Financial Plan approved by the City Council.

Sales and Use Tax for Transportation Improvements

The Board of the Transportation Benefit District, Woodland, Washington, adopted Resolution No. 2016-001 to fund transportation improvements through a sales tax. This proposition authorizes a tax no greater than two-tenths of one percent (0.2%) on all taxable retail sales within the District for ten years pursuant to RCW 82.14.0455. Tax proceeds will fund projects identified in the Transportation Improvement Programs adopted by the City of Woodland beginning with the 2017-2022 TIP Plan.

**Battle Ground School District No. 119**  
**Proposition No. 1**

Bonds to Replace, Renovate and Construct School Facilities and Improve Safety

The Board of Directors of Battle Ground School District No. 119 adopted Resolution No. L-16, concerning a proposition to relieve overcrowding and improve infrastructure and safety. This proposition would authorize the District to: construct new K-4/5-8 Campuses to replace Glenwood/Laurin Campus and Pleasant Valley Campus, replace select Prairie High School buildings, construct a new K-4/5-8 Campus, renovate Amboy School Gymnasium and 300 Building, and make safety, technology, educational, infrastructure and athletic improvements; issue no more than \$80,000,000 of general obligation bonds maturing within 21 years; and levy annual excess property taxes to repay the bonds, all as provided in Resolution No. L-16.
